Town Meeting House Bicentennial



The Jewel in the Crown of the Town of Shrewsbury.

On Sunday, November 21, 2004, the Shrewsbury Historical Society Program Committee co-chaired with the Shrewsbury Community Church Committee to present a program celebrating the 200th Anniversary of the Shrewsbury Meeting House.

The festivities began in the sanctuary with Eldred French as Master of Ceremonies introducing Mark Youngstrom, who spoke about the history of the Meeting House, and Pastor Chris Heintz, who spoke about the history of the Shrewsbury Community Church. Eldred then introduced Bill Smith who related stories about the recently restored Johnson Opus 235 pipe organ, B-J Stewart told stories of the 1973 flood, Marcos Levy spoke on the beauty of music and the many ways music was enjoyed in the Meeting House and Shrewsbury Historical Society President Al Ridlon,

Sr. spoke about the various ham suppers and events held for the Fire Department in the Meeting House.

Don Butler then spoke about the various exhibits being shown on both floors, and invited all to partake refreshments on the first floor.

A video station was set up by Con Winkler to record memories of the Town Meeting House by those who wished to comment. The Society thanks Paul Sgalia, Rene Pollock, Dick Adams, Nancy Spencer, Donna Smith, Jonathan Gibson, Grace Brigham, Sharon Winnicki, Don Butler, Dino Rice, Barry Griffith and Ruth Winkler for their memories, some of which follow:

Robert Frost, NBC Visit Meeting House in 1957

NBC TV, Dave Garroway's "WIDE WIDE WORLD" visited Shrewsbury Center LIVE on Sunday, March 31, 1957.

Vermont's beloved poet, Robert Frost, then at 83, recited "Mending Walls" in the Town Meeting House sanctuary, and square dancing was held in the meeting room downstairs.

The program also visited Willard Smith's sugar bush and sugar house showing young Bill Smith helping his father in sugarin', and outside Robert Frost strolled along Lottery Road reciting "The Gift Outright", with the beautiful panoramic view behind him.

Standing in front of the signs with N. Shrewsbury pointing in one direction and Cuttingsville in the other, Frost said, "that's what you like about Vermont. A fella always knows where he's at."

Aresident's Note:

During this past busy year the Shrewsbury Historical Society accomplished the following: a plaque was placed in the vestibule of the museum commemorating the acquisition of the building from the Community Church; reprinted 500 soft cover copies of the history book, "Shrewsbury, Vt - Our Town As It Was"; a telephone was installed in the storage area; applied for a matching grant from the Vt. Arts Council to build an earthen ramp and second exit/entrance to the museum; and had necessary roof slates replaced.

The Fund Raising Committee held two successful events, one in the spring and one in the fall. The Society was represented at the June Expo 2004 in Tunbridge with an exhibit on one-room schoolhouses. On July 3rd, the museum opened for the summer with an Open House and closed for the season on October 31st. The Program Committee co-hosted a program with the Community Church in celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the Town Hall/Meeting House held in November.

I want to thank the officers, trustees and committee members for all their hard work and dedication to the Historical Society.

Shrewsbury's Bicentennial in 1980 Celebrated with Events and Book

Twenty-four years ago, Shrewsbury celebrated the 200th anniversary of the formal organization of the Town with special events such as an antique car parade complete with oxen and the Mill River High School Band, ending at the Town Meeting House. The President of the Historical Society Elliott Haynes spoke and introduced Representative James Jeffords. In the field, there was a Revolutionary War encampment and mock battle.

Inside the Town Meeting House, the Historical Society celebrated the publication of the town's first history book, *Shrewsbury, Vermont - Our Town As It Was*, with a book signing by author Dawn W. Hance. By nightfall, over 400 copies of the book were sold.

May



In Times Past Ash House Was A Necessity

Member Dick Adams has been able to determine that the above Ash House is probably the only one remaining in Shrewsbury.

Many years ago, settlers used the ash house to store the ashes that provided the lye which in turn made the soap.

This house was fireproof constructed with a floor and roof comprised of single slabs of slate. The large maple tree behind it is an indication of the age of this building. In growing, it has pushed the roof forward and has started to displace the bricks.

In Memoriam

Grace Husselman, a Life Member. The Society received word of Grace's passing in February of this year, too late for the 2003 Newsletter. Grace died on November 3, 2003 in North Carolina. She was predeceased by husband Sam in 2002. They were copresidents of the Society in 1987-88. The Husselmans owned and operated The Buckmaster Inn in Shrewsbury for many years.

Paul Anthony, a Life Member, died on October 24, 2004. Paul was an Engineering Consultant, a member of the Town's Planning Commission, and a talented musician who entertained with his cello at many Town of Shrewsbury events, among which were the Chamber Music Bicentennial Concert in the Town Hall in 1992, and the Historical Society's Victorian Christmas Tour of Laurel Hall in 1994.

Paul spoke about Town Meeting Day and Arthur Patten; Rene remembered the time she started warming the stove in the kitchen of the Meeting House which ended up with a visit from the Fire Department; Nancy remembered her experience of singing in the choir next to Dr. Martyn, who was tone deaf and of the successful chicken pot pie dinners held by the Ladies Aid; Donna spoke about the National Guard stationed at the Town Meeting House and Maple Crest Inn during the flood of 1973 and the way the Fire Dept. Women's Auxiliary and Community Church Ladies Aid came together to feed the men at the Meeting House; Jonathan spoke about this past Election Day in the Meeting House when the Jeffords arrived too early to vote; Grace remembered all the Ladies Auxiliary events at the Meeting House of which her mother was a member and of their untiring efforts to decorate for every event; Sharon spoke about the important political figures and musicians who visited the Town Meeting House, the special sign that used to grace the front of the building which read "Spirit is Spoken Here", and the wonder of the Town Meeting Days; Don remembered that after he and Lois purchased the Shrewsbury Inn, they discovered that Shrewsbury was a "dry" town, that they then had to petition the town at the next Meeting Day; and Ruth recalled visiting the Town Meeting House in 1980 to purchase a copy of the Historical Society's book, "Shrewsbury, Vermont -Our Town As It Was" during the bicentennial celebration of the organization of the Town.

The tape showing the complete 200th Celebration of the Town Meeting House will be added to the archives of the Historical Society.

Dick Adams prepared a souvenir folder of the Meeting House Anniversary Celebration with an Appreciation page dedicated to Nancy Spencer, along with Meeting House history and selected photos.

The Society thanks co-chairs Fran Patten of the Historical Society and Rene Pollock of the Community Church, the Society's Program Committee consisting of Monder and Ginny Buckley.
